

#### LUFFA competes in FFA National Convention

Day one of the National Convention consisted of going to tour at Sugar Creek Packing Co. in Dayton, Ohio. John S. Richardson established Sugar Creek in 1966 as a raw bacon manufacturer in Washington Courthouse, Ohio. In 2023 Sugar Creek now has six major facilities. Their main focus is producing excellent packaged foods for retail, food service channels, providing a wide-ranging, valueadded assortments of fully-cooked and raw bacon for their consumers across the world.

Later on in the day the chapter attended the first session of the 96th National FFA Convention & Expo. During the session we heard from Juan Bendaña. His motivational speech was over things that help you to build confidence; bring great energy, and be courageous. He gave some great examples of these topics. His first one was he recently got engaged and on his trip to Hawaii his fiance booked an open water swim with sharks that was non refundable. His other example was "Be like Pepe," Pepe was a miniature pony that he rode when he was on vacation visiting his family. While he was on a ride, there was a very poisonous snake blocking the path to move forward. Pepe faced the snake with absolutely no fear at least from what Juan could tell and stomped the snake. We ended the day with going to a haunted house at the 13th hour.

On day two of convention members got to walk around the expo center and career show. The expo center hosts many clothing stores to advertise agriculture businesses and small businesses in general. The Career show consists of many different colleges promoting their agricultural programs along with conversing with FFA members on how their colleges and programs can help further their education. Along with colleges there were businesses promoting so that kids were able to see what a job at their business would look like.

Later the chapter attended the second general session of the FFA convention where the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd star chapters were announced. Later on that evening the chapter attended the Buckeye Bash. The Felicity Franklin and Liberty Union FFA chapters hosted the Buckeye Bash at Kelsay Farms. While at the Buckeye Bash, members from numerous FFA chapters in Ohio got the chance to participate in dancing, 9 square, cornhole, bouncy pillow, pumpkin tic tac toe, basketball, or sit by outdoor fires when the night got too cold.

Day three consisted of informational tours for the Liberty Union FFA chapter. The first stop was a trip to Ozark fisheries in Martinsville, Indiana. Ozark fisheries was created in 1926 by F. Lawrence Bailliere and Dr. Charles A. Furrow. Ozark fisheries was originally known as a prolific goldfish hatchery and throughout time their inventory expanded to ornamental goldfish, koi, snails, and crawfish. The hatchery tour guided the students through the process of growing these products and showed the final result of all the work. This tour taught the chapter about the

history of Ozark fisheries as well as how their operation works.

The next tour of the day was at Hunter's Honey Farm also located in Martinsville, Indiana. The current owners of the farm are fourth generation beekeepers and have numerous hives all throughout the state. The tour of honey farm included information about all the products that can be harvested from a bee hive, how they package honey, honey tasting, and a viewing of an operational hive. Each kid was allowed to take home a honey bottle and two sticks as a part of their tour.

Day four of the FFA National Convention was a short, but important day. The American degree ceremony is on the final day and Liberty Union had 4 recipients receive their American degrees. Those recipients are Sydney Kagey, Alex Shy, Austin Ety, and Gavin Eastep. The requirements to earn the American FFA Degree are set forth in the National FFA Constitution. To be eligible to receive the American FFA Degree, members must meet qualifications such as receiving a State FFA Degree, holding active membership for the past three years, completing secondary instruction in an agricultural education program and operating outstanding supervised agricultural experience program. Community service, leadership abilities and outstanding scholastic achievement are also required. We are extremely proud of all of their accomplishments and hard work.

from Lancaster Boy Scout Troop 165, built a wheelchair-accessible bridge at Alley Park in Lancaster, Ohio. This is the first trail of its kind at Alley Park and it will make nature education and exploration accessible to people of any ability. This walkway will provide new opportunities for park visitors to get under the canopy of the trees, enjoy the unique view of Lake Loretta created by the bridge, and experience nature like never before at Alley Park. This walkway connects to a multi-sensory nature education trail being installed by a Girl Scout as a separate project.

This project took Andrew two years of planning, six months of construction, and over 1500 volunteer hours from 25 volunteers. Project cost is estimated at \$75,000. Andrew raised over \$10,000 from service organizations including VFW, American Legion, Lions Clubs, Kiwanis and

Andrew Carter, an Eagle Scout Rotary, a grant from South Central Power Foundation, and from friends and family. The remainder of the project budget was donated in-kind from construction companies, suppliers, and skilled individuals. This project was made possible through the generous support of equipment from Columbus Equipment Company, materials from The Shelly Company and Igel Construction, paving by AJ Asphalt, engineering by Sands Decker Surveyors and Engineers, and countless hours from volunteer equipment operators.

The Eagle project is an opportunity for a Scout to demonstrate leadership while completing a project to benefit the community. Carter shared, "The most rewarding part of being the leader was seeing the project from start to finish. This project will be a large milestone in my high school career and one I will carry with me the rest of my life."

The skills are so demanding and the challenges so great, that only six percent of Scouts attain the rank of Eagle. Andrew is the son of Joe and Shannon Carter of Carroll, Ohio, and recently celebrated achieving the rank of Eagle Scout at a Court of Honor held at Alley Park Lodge. The ceremony was attended by special guests including Lancaster Mayor Don McDaniel, Fairfield County Commissioners Steve Davis and Dave Levacy, Ohio Representative Kevin D. Miller, and Ohio Senator Tim Schaffer. For all their help and volunteer hours on his Eagle Project, Andrew recognized three project mentors: Noah Akers, Alley Park Caretaker; Bill Catte of Catz Excavating, Inc.; and Jerrod George of Igel Construction.



#### Junior Fair Market Beef **Tagging Announced**

It's time once again to prepare for Jr. Market Beef tagging and weigh-in. This year it is being conducted in a fashion like recent years but in addition will include exhibitors planning to participate in the recently created 'finished' Dairy Beef Steer project in Fairfield County.

Market beef weigh-in for traditional beef animals as well as dairy beef steers is set for Saturday, March 9, 2024, at Fairfield Cattle Company located at 3443 Cincinnati-Zanesville Road (S.R. 22), Lancaster, from 8:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. In advance of March 9th exhibitors will be required to tag their own market beef animals with an 840 EID tag (unless the calf already has an EID tag). Visual numbered tags are encouraged but will not be provided or required this year. As

in the recent past, participants will submit a hair follicle DNA sam-

Youth/families are expected to apply the required tag in the calf's ear prior to weigh/tag-in on March 9, 2024, and submit their individual and/or family exhibitor information, calf tagging, and housing information by March 8,



#### Decorative Arts Center of Ohio presents From Struggle to Strength: Inspiring Journeys of Central Ohio's Refugee Community

LANCASTER, OH-The Decorative Arts Center of Ohio in Lancaster showcases the work of central Ohio photographer and filmmaker Tariq Tarey, whose photographic portraits help tell the powerful and important stories of members of central Ohio's refugee community.

In From Struggle to Strength: Inspiring Journeys of Central Ohio's Refugee Community, Tarey's portraits highlight and honor the experiences that refugees to central Ohio endured as they fled armed conflict, political persecution, human rights abuses, ethnic and religious conflicts and genderbased violence in their native lands for better lives in the United States. The exhibition's more than three dozen black-and-white photographs also inform viewers of the original cultures and ethnicities of their subjects, who hail from countries in East Africa, Africa's Great Lakes region, West Africa, Bhutan, Afghanistan and Iraq.

"These diverse backgrounds reflect the global nature of refugee issues and the resilience of individuals forced to leave their homes in search of hope and a better life,"

said Tarey, who curated From Struggle to Strength. "The exhibition aims to shed light on their experiences and strength in the face of adversity and serves as a testament to the central Ohio community."

Tarey's extensive research into his subjects' cultural backgrounds and unique stories results in portraits of uncommon insight. Imbued with compassion and care, his work suggests that a genuine desire to understand the people of central Ohio's immigrant community can help everyone forge connections across cultural lines.

"Tariq's work reveals the humanity of his subjects in both powerful and subtle ways, allowing us all to see each person not just as static images on the wall, but as real people who have endured through unimaginable struggles to build new lives here in Central Ohio," said Jason Crabill, executive director of the Decorative Arts Center of Ohio. "I hope this exhibition introduces our visitors to the many challenges refugees face around the world, and highlights the beauty and richness of the cultures, traditions and perspectives they bring with them to our shared home.'

Ultimately the stories told through the images in From Struggle to Strength are more than personal stories - they are part of America's longstanding and ongoing narrative of opening its doors to people seeking refuge from afar.

"I feel that everyone can use a reminder that their families were once immigrants," said Michael Johnson, marketing director of the Fairfield County Heritage Association and museum director of Lancaster's Sherman House Museum. "It's important to understand that the struggles, fears, insecurities and challenges that today's immigrants are facing are the same ones that our own families faced. Understanding history should encourage us to be more empathetic to those in a similar position today."

Running concurrently with From Struggle to Strength: Inspiring Journeys of Central Refugee Ohio's Community is Perspective of Color, an exhibition of paintings by central Ohio painter Hani Hara. Born in Egypt, Hara immigrated to Ohio when still a child and began painting at age 40. This sampling of paintings created over the span of 35 years embodies Hara's intensely colorful and uniquely expressive approach to painting human faces.

#### Putting one foot forward

In November 2015 Laquinta Hayes was on her way home in her brand-new car when she was broadsided by a drunk driver. After the accident she was having pain in her right leg, so she decided to see a chiropractor named Dr. Anderson.

Laquinta told her chiropractor about her accident and her numerous trips to the ER, and how nothing seemed to be helping. Dr. Anderson tried several things to help Laquinta like massage and electric shock, but he didn't see things getting any better.

Dr. Anderson wanted to run tests because the swelling wouldn't go down in Laquinta's leg. He sent Laquinta for an MRI and found out that there was a reason Laquinta's leg wouldn't heal. Dr. Anderson told Laquinta that she had osteosarcoma. a rare bone cancer. Laquinta was the a chiropractor that he had to tell this to. Laquinta was in shock. She had never heard of sarcoma. She had just thought the pain and swelling was from working two jobs and being on her feet all day.

Laquinta is one of the lucky ones. The challenge with osteosarcoma is that a diagnosis isn't always made right away, because the symptoms are common to other health problems. According to St. Jude Children's Hospital, 15 to 20% of patients' osteosarcoma has spread by the time it is diagnosed. Not only was Laquinta lucky to have survived her car accident, but she was lucky her leg bone didn't break or it would have caused the cancer to spread throughout her body.

Laquinta is thankful to have a knowledgeable chiropractor who knew something wasn't right, and was able to focus on the symptoms and not the statistics. Many adults

with sarcoma go undiagnosed, because sarcoma is usually diagnosed in children and teens, not adults. Laquinta's doctor didn't look at her age. He looked at her symptoms to diagnosis her.

Dr. Anderson referred Laquinta was introduced to Dr. Joel Mayerson. Laquinta's story. Right away Laquinta knew Dr. Mayerson was the right doctor for her. He made her feel like he really cared and that she was family, not just a number. She did six rounds of chemo to help shrink the sarcoma before Dr. Mayerson amputated her


The first year after losing her leg, Laquinta grieved the loss of her old life. She was angry every day and each day was a struggle to get out of bed. Each time Laquinta visited the hospital she would get good news about her progress, and Dr. Mayerson would root her on. Then she would see and hear of other patients who didn't survive. That caused Laquinta to change her mindset to "I will fight for the ones that didn't make it and for the ones who did!"


After losing her job as a welder, Laquinta lost her purpose in life. One day she was at a flea market when a man named Terry Boyd approached her about playing on the USA Women's Softball Team. Laquinta was hesitant and had only played sports for two years when she was 13, but she decided she would check it out. Little did she know how this choice of "Putting One Foot Forward" would change her life.

Laquinta's brave step has led her to play five wheelchair sports including: basketball, rugby, soccer, football and softball. She is constantly training and goes to the gym an hour a day. In fact, while competing for Team USA, Laquinta made the 1st year 5 star line up and the 1st year captain of the team.

Laquinta has proven "Out of pain comes purpose.'

#### Fairfield 33 Alliance's Career Readiness Program receives large grant from state

Alliance is being awarded funding students, parents and community from Ohio Lt. Governor Jon members as Fairfield County faces Husted, Director of the inevitable growth. Governor's Office of Workforce County has made it a p Transformation, through the Industry Sector Partnership (ISP) Grant. The program supports collaborations that help bring Ohioans into the workforce pipeline while meeting the needs of job creators and the local economy.

LANCASTER, OH – The development is a priority for local Development businesses, elected officials, County has made it a priority to help local employers connect with work-ready students to build a pipeline of skilled workers.

"The Career Readiness Program targets students who have yet to decide what path they are choosing after high school, said Fairfield County Economic Director Rick Szabrak. "This program helps connect them to local jobs, changing their trajectory to career success and becoming productive members of the community."

The Workforce Center and Career Readiness programs now serve all eight school districts in the county. Commissioner Dave Levacy said offering a path to employment for high school students is a solution to many of the challenges facing a growing county.


