Her Sophomore year, she earned 1st team Mid State League in the 1600 M run, 880 Yard Run, qualifying for the state track meeting in the 1600M and Mile Relay. In 1980, the 880 Yard Run was converted to the 800 M Run, and again Leslie earned 1st Team Mid State League, qualifying again for the state track meet competing in the 2 mile relay and taking 6th place in the 800 M Run. In her senior year, Leslie earned 1st Team Mid State League in the 800 Meter Run, qualified for the state track meet in the 1600 Meter Run, 1600 Meter Relay and placed 4th in the state in the 800 Meter Run. Leslie is the current 4X400 Relay Liberty Union record holder and held the 800 Meter Record for 35 years until incoming hall of fame inductee Sydnee Mangette broke her record in 2016.

Leslie is a lifelong restauranteur, currently working to buildout family owned Morning Fog Coffee & Eats. Leslie lives in North Carolina with her husband of 30 years, Curt Steinlage. They have 3

children, one grandchild with another on the way. Congratulations, Leslie!

Our third inductee is from the class of 1992 – Kyle Farmer:

Kyle earned 4 varsity letters in football, earning 1st team Mid State League in 1990 and 1991. He was selected MSL Cardinal Division Lineman of the Year in 1991. Kyle was selected 2nd Team Central District in 1990, and 1st Team Central District in 1991. In his junior year, he was selected as pecial mention Division IV All Ôhio, and 2nd Team All Ohio his senior year. Kyle was a member of the Columbus Dispatch-Agonis Club All-Star Football Team and a Sports Medicine Grant Central Ohio All-Star Football Game Participant in 1991.

In track, Kyle earned 4 varsity letters and 1st Team Mid State League and Shot Put Champion in 1990, 1991, 1992, setting a Mid State League Cardinal Division record for being the first 3X Shot Put Champion. In his senior year, he was also the Mid State League Discus Champion. Kyle won the

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Central District Indoor Shot Put Championship in 1991, and was the Outdoor Central District shot Put Champion in 1992. Kyle qualified for the OHSAA State Track & Field Meet in Shot Put in 1991.

After college, Kyle returned to Liberty Union as the Varsity Assistant Football Coach from 1993-2003, the Varsity Track Coach in 1998, 1991 and 2001 earning Cardinal Division Coach of the Year in 2001. Kyle was also the Varsity Softball coach in 2020 and 2021.

Kyle and his wife Kristi are both educators and live in the Liberty Union school district with their 2 children.

In her junior and senior year, she earned 1st Team All Central District, and 3rd Team

Governor DeWine gets first-hand look at Lancaster City Schools' literacy success

After the tour, school board members assembled in the library with Governor DeWine, Ohio Department of Education and Workforce Director Steve Dackin, Lancaster City Schools Superintendent Nathan Hale, Assistant Superintendent Dr. Jeromey Sheets, the district's team of instructional coaches, including Donna McCance, Brenda Zeiders; and Medill Elementary School Principal Jennifer Woods. submitted

City Schools welcomed Governor Mike DeWine and Ohio Department of Education and Workforce Director Steve Dackin to Medill Elementary School recently to experience the success the district has had since implementing a rigorous literacy and phonics program in both elementary and middle schools.

While literacy has been a prime focus for the district for decades, the implementation of instructional coaches and a school-wide literacy plan for each school began in 2019 and has led to Lancaster City Schools exceeding Ohio School Report Card standards as high as 68 percent for third-grade students and 67 percent for fifth-grade students in 2023. Currently, the district is uti-

LANCASTER, OH: Lancaster lizing instruction designed by EL Education that involves the entire class in its instruction. The adoption of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) approved 95 percent Group Tier 1 and Tier 2 Phonics Program and the Orton Gillingham Level 2 and Supervisor Training took place in 2023.

The Governor's tour included a visit to a first-grade class taught by Natalie Hetzler featuring 95 percent Phonics instruction, a second-grade class featuring small group discussion led by Christina Hartman, and a third-grade classroom demonstrating the EL Curriculum module with Denise Mauck. School board members then assembled in the library with Governor DeWine, Dackin, Lancaster City Schools Superintendent Nathan Hale, Assistant

Superintendent Dr. Jeromey Sheets, the district's team of instructional coaches, including Donna McCance, Brenda Zeiders; and Medill Elementary School Principal Jennifer Woods.

Steve Dackin was quick to congratulate the district on its initiative. "Kudos to you and your leadership," he said. "I'm really impressed, Governor. I just think they have figured out how you distribute leadership throughout a school district to do what's right for every student."

"And they are doing it with unrelenting focus, too," agreed Governor DeWine. "We have been touring around to a lot of different schools, determining what works, and this is working. So, thank you."

Governor DeWine also asked Dr. Sheets and Superintendent Hale what advice they have for school districts that are in the initial stages of rolling out similar literacy programs.

"You have to be willing to buy into the fact of how important literacy is and be willing to pick the best program," Sheets said. "We had other options for training that would only take 18 hours, but we chose in Lancaster to put our teachers through two years of training because we want our kids to have the best-trained teachers in the state of Ohio."

The question of funding such a program was raised by the Governor and much credit was given by Superintendent Hale to the LCS School Board.

'Our school board understands the importance of literacy and we are fortunate to have the financial capacity to implement these programs right now," Hale said. What Dr. Sheets and his team have achieved is incredible. We have kindergarteners entering schools at a 25th percentile in terms of readiness and we see them climbing up to 60th and 70th percentiles by third grade. It speaks volumes about the programming they have put into place."

"These investments are truly going to make a difference for with developmental

disabilities and their families by giving them more access to the communities where they live," said Governor Mike DeWine. "People with developmental disabilities deserve opportunities, a reliable workforce, and an accessible state to live, learn, work, and succeed in."

As part of the 14.9 million ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funding, the money will be dispersed across 67 counties throughout the state to better serve Ohio residents and their families who have a developmental disability.

The chemotherapy chosen for Cooper was called vinorelbine. It is a clinical trial that has been going on for about 10 years in Europe for patients with Rhabdomyosarcoma. Coop's doctor wanted to just do the weekly IV chemo for the first month and to monitor him closely to make sure his liver functions were staying steady. Then slowly introduce the oral pill at a low dose and monitor Cooper's liver to hopefully increase it to its proper dose. Studies have shown that patients who did the trial had 85% success rate. In Cooper's case (with him stopping treatment and getting VOD 2 times) there isn't much data with this trial, but doctor's think it should give him a 45% chance of relapse. Jessie is hopeful that it will make a difference.

Cooper has taken his cancer diagnosis in stride and instead of focusing on his cancer, he focuses on making memories. When his hair started to fall out Coop decided he wanted a "Buzz Party." His mom ordered 50 pink beanies for anyone who wanted to shave their heads for Coop. He made the first cuts on everyone who showed up! Word got out and his mom ended up buying 350 more beanies. Even a young girl in his grade shaved her head for Coop.

Jessie shares that she has learned so much from Cooper's cancer diagnosis. Jessie shares that if something doesn't seem right to trust your gut. She also shares that when you go through something to let other people help you. She wouldn't have been able to get through Cooper's cancer diagnosis, without the help of friends and family bringing dinner and volunteering to help her with her

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Veno-Occlusive Disease is an uncommon liver problem in which the liver cannot function properly. It is a complication that can happen after a blood and marrow transplant, but since these don't pertain to Cooper, doctors can't figure out why he got it. Afterwards, Cooper went to Children's Hospital and did 19 treatments there.

The chemo treatment plan Cooper had was VAC. The National Cancer Institute shares that VAC contains the drugs vincristine dactinomycin sulfate, (Actinomycin-D), and cyclophosphamide. Combinations of drugs are best since different drugs kill cancer cells in different ways. Cooper was supposed to have a 14-cycle treatment plan, but was only able to finish 11 treatments due to blood clots that lodged in the top of his colon/bottom of his intestines and getting VOD again.

On January 4, 2024, Cooper's parents were told that they should daughter.

Cooper and his family have had a lot of support from the community, and they call these special people "Cooper's Army." Cooper's mom is in the process of starting a foundation called "Cooper's Troopers." Jessie explains "We wanted to start a foundation in Coop's name, so we can give back to our community and help others the way so many hundreds of people have helped us and supported us through this last year."

Regional Planning Commission to hold public meeting to vote on county Comprehensive Plan



LANCASTER, OH ----The Comprehensive Plan, which will serve as a guide for Fairfield County to manage growth in a strategic and thoughtful way, will be considered by the Regional Planning Commission (RPC) at a public meeting on March 5, 2024, at 6 p.m. The meeting will be held at the Fairfield County Workforce Center located at 4465 Coonpath Road NW, Carroll.

At that meeting, the RPC will vote on recommending the beginning of the process, followed

Fairfield County Commissioners their consideration. If for approved, it will then be sent to Fairfield County the Commissioners to consider in a public meeting on March 19, 2024, at 9 a.m. at the Fairfield County Courthouse, 3rd Floor, Commissioners' Hearing Room. The plan development process

started in October of 2022, engaging a steering committee of 36 community leaders. Planning NEXT, a professional community planning company, was hired by the committee to oversee the planning process. The company conducted a series of more than 30 stakeholder interviews that included township trustees of every township in the county, leaders of villages and cities and other community leaders and hosted a public meeting at the

Comprehensive Plan to the by multiple opportunities for inperson and online feedback.

After a public meeting in September, Fairfield County Commissioners determined additional opportunities for public input were necessary, and subsequently conducted meetings with local township and municipal leaders and citizens to obtain additional input. Accordingly, several changes have been made to the plan to address concerns and ideas raised in these meetings.



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
