Below are photos of the old railroad stations we have lost in Walnut Township. Plus I have thrown in as a bonus the history of the Zanesville & Western Railroad. Lakeside used to have a railroad stop at the Old Lakeside Hotel that was burned down in the 1970s. The one in New Salem is owned by a local farmer that uses it for storage. The New Salem station at Canal Road and Elevator Road is the only one left. Millersport's restored depot is in Stewart, Ohio next to the Federal Hocking Schools campus as the centerpiece of a unique resort called the "Hideaway on the Hocking."

At some point, Grandpa Harry became the sole owner of the ten acre property. Around 1918, Grandpa Harry had a mineral water plant at Buckeye Lake. In 1919 he received a watercraft license to sell and deliver "pop" on Buckeye Lake. During the 1920's Albert Justus and Harry, sometimes referred to as Hedgie, became partners in a beverage company called the Buckeye Lake Bottling Works. It is interesting to note that before he and Harry became partners, Justus allegedly violated the Crabbe Act by having in his "soft drink saloon" a hard drink cider that was greater than one-half of one percent alcohol. Many different flavors of pop were produced at the Buckeye Lake Bottling Works. The bottles were of thick glass, either green or clear, with the words "Buckeye Lake Bottling Works, Buckeye Lake, O." spelled out in a circle and the words "J & P PROPS" inside the circle. There are a few very rare bottles with "HARRY T. PAIRAN, PROP" in the middle. It is unclear whether these were produced before or after Grandpa Harry's partnership with Albert Justus. Many of these bottles were simply thrown into Buckeye Lake when they were empty, and are still occasionally during operations. No one knows when the pop factory ceased to exist, but Grandpa Harry died at age 68 in 1942 and is buried in Millersport Cemetery. 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

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
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Dear Hank

Dear Hank,

Easter is coming up, and I was wondering if there is anything I need to be aware of, to protect my pets over the holidays?

Sincerely, A Concerned Pet Parent

Dear Concerned Pet Parent,

Easter is a great holiday full of flowers and yummy candy, but there are also many dangers to be aware of at Easter time. Pet parents need to be aware of chocolate, sugar-free treats, Easter grass, certain foods and some plants.

The Kennel Club explains that chocolate contains a chemical called theobromine, which can be poisonous to dogs, as well as most other animals, including cats, rodents and rabbits. The darker and more expensive the chocolate, the more theobromine it contains. Chocolate, wrapped in foil, can also cause damage to the throat and digestive tract of

Sugar-Free treats can also be dangerous to pets at Easter. Xylitol is an artificial sweetener, often found in sugar-free candies, gum and peanut butter. Some items that include this dangerous toxin, include jelly beans, lollipops, and taffy.

Max's Corner (a website that shares tips to pet parents) shares that Easter grass can be dangerous to pets. The shiny, colorful material can be ingested by pets, and can cause gastrointestinal including possible upset. obstructions that require surgery. Instead of using plastic Easter grass, you can use shredded, recycled paper instead.

Easter Foods can also be toxic to our pets, as they hang out around the dinner table. Grapes and raisins can cause kidney failure in both dogs and cats. Onion and garlic can damage red blood cells in both as well. Macadamia nuts can cause weakness, tremors, and muscle weakness in dogs. Avocados contain persin, which can cause

gastrointestinal upset and diarrhea in dogs and cats. Bones, especially cooked ones, can splinter and cause internal damage to dogs and cats, including choking, intestinal blockages, and even perforation of the stomach or intestines.

Joii Pet Care educates people about the dangers of plants and flowers around Easter. Daffodil bulbs are toxic to both dogs and cats. Symptoms of poisoning include: vomiting, diarrhea, and stomach pain. Daffodils can also cause slow heart rate and seizures. Hyacinths and tulip bulbs are also harmful if eaten. Symptoms of poisoning include: quick onset drooling, vomiting, diarrhea, and stomach pain. Hyacinths can also cause intestinal blockages. Easter Lilies are also a poisonous Easter flower. Cats can swallow pollen when they groom their coats, without directly eating the plant. Symptoms of poisoning include: nausea, drooling, vomiting, lethargy, and not eating. Easter Lilies can be life-threatening for cats, and can cause mouth and stomach upset for dogs.

Easter is a fun and tasty holiday, just make sure it is a safe holiday for all of those involved.

Gardening Planning for Eager Green Thumbs

Remember even though we might have nice warm spring days in the forecast, the average frostfree date for most of Fairfield County is well after Mother's Day. Despite the advice to wait, many gardeners get an itchy green thumb and will risk the chance of frost and plant veggies in April, but they should be prepared to watch the day and night temperatures on the weather forecasts and apply row cover protection when needed.

There are some vegetables that are resistant to frost and prefer cooler growing temperatures. Cole crops like broccoli and cabbage thrive in the cool temperatures of early spring, but do not direct sow well. These plants do best started from seed indoors and planted 4 weeks later into the garden or can be purchased as transplants.

As soon as the ground can be worked and is not saturated, peas can be directly sown at depths of two inches. In addition, you can also add some lettuce, spinach, beets and onions your garden plus a good early season potato like Yukon Gold.

Now is the perfect time to draw up plans for your garden including the types of plants you want to grow, the amount of seed you need to meet the demands of your family, and the space required for success. A soil test is always a good place to start. Soil testing services are available through OSU Extension and getting a soil test done before planting your garden will help you create a garden design where plants will thrive. 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Lancaster Festival board of directors announces beverage policy change for concert grounds

Lancaster, OHIO - Due to requirements by the insurance industry for festivals of its type, the Lancaster Festival board of directors is implementing a new policy regarding beverages at the Ohio University-Lancaster concert venue.

Beginning this season, no beverages will be permitted to be brought into the concert venue gates. This includes both alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages, including water.

"We understand that this might be inconvenient and frustrating for some of our long-time patrons, but the decision is truly out of our hands," said Deb Connell, Executive Director, Lancaster Festival. "Without proper insurance, we simply cannot have a festival. We postponed this change as long as we could, but unfortunately, we are now forced to revise our policy to continue to hold the Lancaster Festival."

The Lancaster Festival had been "grandfathered in" to a previous law in Ohio Revised Code. It was the only remaining festival in Ohio that allowed people to bring their own beverages in while also selling alcohol on site. State law now prohibits this practice, due to liability, the inability of venues to obtain adequate insurance and other legal considerations.

There will be increased points of sale on the concert grounds to accommodate the increase in demand for beverages. Water (16 oz.) will be sold for \$1 to keep the price at a minimum for concert goers. A selection of beer (16 oz.), wine, pre-made cocktails will be sold for \$8 each and soda will be \$3 each. There will also be a pre-order option available for beverages with ticket purchase.

Food is still permitted to be brought in, as well as ice to keep food cold in coolers, but remember that glass is prohibited.

Exceptions to the no beverage policy will be made for individuals with medical needs (baby formula, breast milk, liquid medications, etc.), and these individuals will be asked to enter through a specific gate for inspection of the liquids.

"We appreciate understanding and patience of our supporters and concert goers," said Connell. "And we look forward to welcoming you to the 2025 Lancaster Festival."

House bill honors fallen military members, first responders, and elected officials

COLUMBUS - The Ohio raised in Carroll. He went on to Senate passed House Bill 81, serve the country as a member of which honors fallen military members, first responders, and elected officials. "Both of these bills honor two American heroes from Fairfield County who gave their lives protecting and defending our country," Schaffer said. "These designations will ensure we remember their legacies of service along with countless other incredible Ohioans."

The Senate Bill amendment names a portion of U.S. Route 33 in Fairfield County as the "Lance Corporal James F. Kimple Memorial Highway."

the United States Marine Corps Combat Logistics Battalion 1, 1st Marine Logistics Group, I Marine Expeditionary Force stationed at Camp Pendleton, California. Lance Corporal Kimple was killed in action while supporting combat operations in Anbar province, Iraq on May 2, 2008, during his second deployment to Iraq.

The Senate Bill amendment designates a portion of Refugee Road in Fairfield County as the "Corporal David A. Johnston Memorial Highway." Corporal Johnston was a 1967 graduate of Pickerington High School and was killed in action in South Vietnam on March 3,1969. He was Pickerington High School's only casualty during the Vietnam War and is the namesake of American Kimple was born in Logan and Legion Post 283 in Pickerington.

Muscle Quality Performance Contests Open

Entries for the 2025 Fairfield County Jr. Fair Goat, Swine, and Lamb MQP programs are now being accepted. Again, this year all MQP entries will be accepted online and must be submitted by April 15, 2025.

Please note that some of the important MQP details have changed as follows:

Goats for the MQP contest must be owned by May 17, 2025, and will be weighed-in on that date at the fairgrounds. After 99 days on feed the Goat MQP contest will conclude at the fairgrounds on Sunday, August 24, 2025. NEW for this year, female goats may now be entered in MQP, and there is no minimum weight requirement at harvest.

Lambs for the MQP contest must be owned by June 28, 2025, and will be weighed at the fairgrounds on that date. After 65 days on feed the MQP lambs will be brought back to the fairgrounds for the conclusion of the contest on September 1, 2025, which – NEW for this year – is Labor Day Monday.

Barrows or gilts for MQP must be owned by June 28, 2025, and will be weighed this year at the fairgrounds on that date. After 71 days on feed the MQP pigs will return to the fairgrounds for the contest conclusion on September 7, 2025. NEW for this year, only two pigs may be weighed/tagged in for MQP and these pigs may not be used for the "live" show at the fair.

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Senate Resolution 21 urges Congress to support prompt and comprehensive mental health treatment for veterans

COLUMBUS—The Senate adopted Senate Resolution 21, sponsored by State Senator Tim Schaffer (R-Lancaster), to urge Congress to support prompt and comprehensive mental health treatment for our nation's veterans.

"This is an issue that was brought to my attention by one of my constituents who is a veteran," said Senator Schaffer. "When it comes to our nation's military personnel and veterans, we should expect complete and full medical care for those men and women who sacrificed their health and well being in service to their country."

According to the United Service Organizations, Inc. (USO), suicide rates among active-duty military members in increased over the past five years. unless

Brown University's Watson Institute for International and Public Affairs states that 30,177 active-duty military personnel and veterans who have served in the military after the terror attacks on September 11, 2001, died by suicide in comparison to the 7,057 service members tragically killed in combat operations during that same time period.


